Best Story has 17 categories

Newspaper staff members can compete for Best Story Contest certificates in 17 individual categories.

Entries are limited to three per school per category. This means one school can enter three stories in the Bost News Story category, three in Best Editorial, etc.

Entries must have appeared in the school newspaper this school year. Articles should be pasted on an 8 1/2 x 11 and include the students name, school and category, like this:

Only students from member schools may compete in the contest, but a check for \$6 accompanying the entries will suffice. Make the check out to SISPA.

For the front page competition, send three tearsheets of front pages. Judge will consider all three as a single entry. Send only three.

Judges will award first, second and third place in each category plus several honorable mentions.

Yearbook copy, photo contests get reprieve

Yearbook staff members at paid member schools may compete in two categories—Copyblock and Black and White Photographs. Entries in both categories must include certification from the yearbook advisor stating that the stories or photos will be in the 1986 yearbook.

Deadline is Mon., Mar. 24.
The black and white photo
can be sports, academics, or
activities. Prints need not
be pasted on cardboard but
include the student's name
and school on the back. Size
should be between 3 1/2" x
5" to 8" x 10."

Copyblocks should be typewritten or photocopied about any subject for the 1986 book. Copyblocks are not captions or identifications, but stories about homecoming, or identifications, but stories about homecoming, prom, fads, concerts. football, science club or other events or happenings during the school year.

First, second, third places plus several honorable mentions will be awarded in both categories.

Although the contest is only open to SISPA member schools, any school wishing to participate can send a Sh check with its entries.

Blue Banner send same issues as '85

Entries for the Blue
Banner and Best Story contests for newspaper staffs
and Copyblock and Photo
Contest for yearbook contests must be postmarked
no later than Mar. 24.
Winners in the contests
will be announced at the
afternoon assembly at the
Spring Conference, Apr. 21.
Certificates will be awarded to winners in the contests.

Rules and guidelines for the contests follow:

Each school must send three copies of its paperthe second issue of the year, a March 1986 issue, and the schools's choice.

Entrants will compete in one of four categories:

I. Printed Illinois Newspaper, Over 600 Enrollment.

II. Printed Illinois Newspapers, Under 600 Enrollment.

III. Mimeographed Newspaper, all Illinois regardless of enrollment.

IV. All out-of-state newspapers.

If advisers want the judges to use papers already sent to SISPA, keep in mind that some action of entry must be made. Automatic entry by the SISPA director has not been welcomed by some advisers. Also: be sure the papers are in the office.

Paid membership in SISPA is not required for this contest.

Thirty-seven papers vied for Blue Banner bonors last year, with 23 of the entrants winning a Blue Banner. Eight schools in Category I were Blue Banner recipients last year. Six won in Category II, three in the mimeographed division and five in the out-of-state category.
