## New student press bill needs verbal support

With the second semester underway, the Illinois Journalism Education Association is urging everyone involved in scholastic publications to push for passage of HB 39, known as the Freedom of Expression Bill.

HB 39 has been introduced by Naperville Rep. Mary Lou Cowlishaw and is co-sponsored by Rep. Barbara Currie.

HB 39 allows public high school administrators to excercise control over student publications for legitimate educational purposes. The bill establishes guidelines regarding the types of expression that can be prohibited, eliminating unconstitutional arbitrary censorship unrelated to the school's educational mission.

In 1997 the bill passed overwhelmingly through both chambers but was vetoed by then Gov. Jim Edgar. The House overrode the veto but no motion to override was called in the Senate.

It is hoped that the bill can become law with current Gov, Jim Ryan.

Six states (Arkansas, Iowa, Kansas, Colorado, California and Massachusets) have had similar laws for over a decade

"Really the best presenters would be our own advisers. We know what our students need, and we are more in touch with high school journalism," Vidakovich said.

Many in the past have been reluctant to volunteer or commit to this task. It is really no different than teaching your own staff or class. No one is expected to have an elaborate presentation, but simply to teach a concept or skill necessary to putting out a high school publication.

## On-Site Contests to be held

The On-Site Writing Contest will once again be a feature of the Spring Conference, scheduled for Monday, April 27, to provide another avenue of competition and learning.

There will be ten different areas of competition. Member schools may enter two students in each category. Registration for the contest will take place the morning of the conference.

The contests will all take place at the same time, so a student may enter only one.

There will be a \$2 fee per student. Entry fees will be collected at registation.

Unless otherwise specified in the contest description, students are to bring only paper and a writing utensil. No typewriters, word processors or computers will be permitted. Also, no tape recorders will be allowed.

Although each contest is geared toward newspaper or yearbook processes, none are exclusively limited to particular staff members.

When students are finished with their competition, they are encouraged to attend the second session of workshops offered by SISPA.

Descriptions of each of the contests is as follows:

- 1. News Writing- Students will be given a fact sheet from which to draw information. Students will then compose a news story from information provided.
- Editorial Writing-Students will be given a fact sheet from which to draw information. After reading the material, students will write an editorial on the topic using their ideas to support or oppose a position.
- Caption Writing- This contest is designed for both newspaper and yearbook staffs. Students will be given several photographs and will write captions. The captions must tell a complete story but not exceed 40 words in length.
- 4. Yearbook Feature Copy Block-A fact sheet will be provided for those entered to write a typical feature copy block.
- 5. Yearbook Sports Copy Block-A fact sheet will be provided for those entered to write a typical sports copy block.
- 6. Yearbook Cover Design- Students will be asked to develop a cover idea based on a theme given to them. Students may bring out sheets, color pencils, markers etc.

- 7. Editing- Students will be asked to proofread a story checking for good journalistic style.
- 8. Sports Writing- Students will be given a fact sheet from which to draw information. They will write a sports newspaper story based on those facts.
- 9. Advertising Design- Students will be given three business information sheets. They will be asked to design ads to fit certain sizes. Students may bring a ruler and any type of pen or pencil. Artistic ability is not necessary as ads will be judged on overall design and areas may be simply marked for art work.
- 10. Review Writing-Students will watch a short video-taped performance. They will write a review commenting on the performance.

Judging will be done by SIUC staff members and winners will be announced in the afternoon meeting.

## Deadline for stories set for March 23

SISPA member newspaper staffs have the opportunity to compete in 20 different categories in the Best Story Contest.

All entries for the Best Story competition must be postmarked March 23, 1999.

As in the past, a school must be a member of SISPA to compete. There is no fee for individuals to enter the Best Story Contest.

Entries should be sent to: SISPA, School of Journalism, Southern Illinois University at Carbondale, Carbondale, IL 62901-6601. Award winners will be named at the Spring Conference, April 19.

Each publication is limited to a maximum of 3 entries per category except front page layout and overall layout. Only send 1 entry for each of these categories. All entries must have been published during the 1998-99 school year.

Tape or glue each individual article on a piece of white 8 1/2" x 11" paper. If an article is too long for one sheet, continue to another sheet(s), stapling together so the entry will not get separated. On the front side of each entry please label as following:

# Best Story Contest's Categories explained

There are a total of 20 categories in the Best Story Contest. Each publication may enter a total of three entries per division except front page and overall layout. They are:

#### Best Original Advertisement

A published ad that is conceived and designed by the student. Ad slicks or ads designed by the advertised company are not eligible.

Best Computer Produced Graphic

Graphic used in lieu of photographs with the intent to enhance any news, feature, or sports article or to aid in the graphic look of the publication. All graphics must be computer produced or enhanced by student.

#### Best Original Art

Artwork used in lieu of photographs with the intent to enhance any news, feature, or sports article or to aid in the graphic look of the publication. All art work in this category must be hand drawn by a student.

#### Best Original Cartoon

A cartoon entry may be editorial or comic. It may be a single frame or multiple frames. Computer produced cartoons are acceptable as long as they are student produced and generated.

#### Best News Story

An article of a news event that presents new information or an angle on already published information or past events,

#### Best Editorial

An article written as a statement or opinion on an issue by the staff. It should not be bylined. It may seek to encourage critical thinking, to mold opinion, or sometimes to promote action.

#### Best Review

An opinion piece that reviews movies, music, plays, concerts, book, exhibits, performances, or other works available to the public or students. Article may be column work or an individual piece.

#### Best In-depth Story

Article should be issue-oriented coverage with emphasis on research, interviewing and analysis. It should be a minimum of 12 column inches.

#### **Cub Division**

Any type of article written by a freshman or sophomore on staff. Guidelines will vary depending on type of article entered. Refer to appropriate cutegory.

#### Best Interview Story

Article is dependent on the use of extensive quotes, Quotations should make up at least 60 percent of the article.

#### Best Feature Story

An article that entertains through material that is interesting but not necessarily important. Emphasis should be on rich detail and liberal use of quotes. It should focus on human interest.

#### Best Featurette

An article that contains the elements of a feature story but is shorter. Length should not exceed 6 columns inches.

#### Best Sports Feature

A sports feature is on a sport-related topics. If would contain the same elements and guidelines of a feature article.

#### Best Photograph with Caption

Photograph can be a news, feature, or sports subject. Along with published picture and caption, if possible, send original photograph so that printing errors can be accounted for

#### Best Humorous Column

An article under a permanent title written regularly and giving expression to the writer's opinion. It would have a lighter tone either through writing style and/or subject matter.

#### Best Editorial Column

An article under a permanent title written regularly and giving expression to the writer's own opinion. The editorial column should be of a serious nature.

#### Best Sports Column

Like the editorial and humorous column, the sports column differs only in that its subject deals with sports.

#### Best Sports Story

A news article that emphasizes timely action, including coverage of sporting events. It may be an advance, follow-p, summary, or combination story.

#### Best Front Page Layout

Enter one front page tearsheet.

#### Best Overall Layout

Enter one complete issue.
