On-site contests expanded

Plans continuing for April 29 conference

The On-Site Writing Contests will again be offered at the Spring Conference. This year, though, two more categories have been added.

The two new categories are Feature Writing and Computer-Designed Infographs.

The feature writing category will be similar to the news writing category but will have a feature fact sheet. The Senior Interview contest will still be offered, but this category will give underclassmen and other seniors an opportunity to write a feature story.

The computer-designed infographs category will take place in a computer lab in the Journalism Department. Students will be given information that they will use to design an infograph. Students will design using Pagemaker.

As in the past, each SISPA member school may enter two students in each category. A student may enter only one contest. There is a \$2 fee per entry.

Unless otherwise specified in the contest description, students are to bring only paper and a writing utensil. No typewriters, word processors or computers will be permitted. Also, no tape recorders will be allowed.

Descriptions of each of the contests is as follows:

1. News Writing- Students will be

given a fact sheet from which to draw information. Students will then compose a news story from information provided. (9:40-11:10)

Feature Writing- Students will be given a fact sheet from which to draw information. Students will then compose a feature story from information provided. (9:40-11:10)

3. Editorial Writing-Students will be given a fact sheet from which to draw information. After reading the material, students will write an editorial on the topic using their ideas to support or oppose a position. (9:40-11:10)

3. Caption Writing- This contest is designed for both newspaper and yearbook staffs. Students will be given several photographs and will write captions.

The captions must tell a complete story but not exceed 40 words in length. (9:40-10:20)

4. Yearbook Feature Copy Block-A fact sheet will be provided for those entered to write a typical feature copy block. (9:40-10:20)

5. Yearbook Sports Copy Block-A fact sheet will be provided for those entered to write a typical sports copy block. (9:40-10:20)

Yearbook Cover Design- Students will be asked to develop a cover idea based on a theme given to them. Students may bring out sheets, color pencils, markers etc. (9:40-11:10)

Editing- Students will be asked to proofread a story checking for good journalistic style. (9:40-10:20)

8. Sports Writing- Students will be given a fact sheet from which to draw information. They will write a sports newspaper story based on those facts. (9:40-11:10)

9. Advertising Design- Students will be given three business information sheets. They will be asked to design ads to fit certain sizes. Students may bring a ruler and any type of pen or pencil. Artistic ability is not necessary as ads will be judged on overall design and areas may be simply marked for art work. (9:40-10:20)

10. Review Writing-Students will watch a short videotaped performance. They will write a review commenting on the performance. (9:40-11:10)

11.Computer-Designed Infographs - Students will be given a fact sheet from which to design an infograph. Students will then use Pagemaker on computers in the Journalism Department to create the infograph. (9:40-11:10)

12. Senior Interview- Seniors will interview a noted figure from the Southern Illinois area and compose a feature story from the information gathered during the interview. (9:40-11:10)

IHSA considers adding journalism to events

In September, the Media Advisory Committee for the Illinois High School Association met, including a journalism instructor for the first time in its history. SISPA member Cathy Sullivan was the teacher.

The committee discussed and approved a plan to present a proposal to the IHSA Board of Directors to create a state-wide series in journalism similar to the ones that exist for speech and music.

The Board gave the proposal green light. Subsequently, IJEA's President Dave Porecca, Dr. James Tidwell of Eastern Illinois University, James Flynn, the IHSA Assistant Executive Director, and Sullivan are trying to hammer out a meeting time to begin planning a concrete proposal to take back to the Board.

The tentative plan is to create a focus group that will determine procedures and rules and get it ready to take back to the Media Advisory Committee next fall who will approve and send it on to the Board for a vote. If all goes well, contests may be in place as early as 04-05.

Those students competing in the Computer-Designed Infographics contest will meet in the lobby after the opening session. Students will then be escorted to the Journalism

The afternoon assembly will begin at 12:45 p.m. with awards for yearbook photo and copy and Best Story awards for newspapers being pre-

The On-Site Contest and Senior Interview winners will be announced at that time also. The conference will be completed by 1:30 p.m.

Best Story categories reviewed

There are a total of 20 categories in the Best Story Contest. Each publication may enter a total of three entries per division except front page and overall layout. Each entry should be attached to a sheet which includes the name of the student, the school and the category. Entries are to be postmarked by Wednesday, March 26.

 Best Original Adversisement
 A published ad that is conceived and designed by the student. Ad slicks or ads designed by the advertised company are not aligible

- Best Computer Produced Graphic Graphic used in Heu of photographs with the intent to enhance may news, feature, or sports article or to aid to the graphic look of the publi-cation. Ail graphics must be commutes produced or enhanced by gradent.

Best Original Art

Artwork used in lies of photographs with the intent to enhance any news, feature, or sports article or to sid in the graphic took of the publi-cation. All an work in this category must be hand drawn by a sinder.t.

-Best Original Cartoon A cartoon entry may be editorial or comic. It may be a single frame or multiple frames. Componer produced pertoons are acceptable as long as they are student produced and generated. Best News Story

An smide of a news event that presents now information or an angle on sirestly published information or past events.

- Best Editorial An unitale written as a statement or opinion on an issue by the stail. It should not be bylined. It may seek to excourage critical thinking, to mold opinicm, or sometimes to promote action.

- Best Review An opinion piece that reviews movies, music, pinys, concerts, book, expibits, performances, or other works available to the public or students. Anticle may be column work or an individual

- Best In-depth Story Article should be issue oriented coverage with emphasis on research, interviewing and analysis. It should be a minimum of 12 covernments **Cub Division**

Any type of enticle written by a freshman or sophomore on staff. Guidelines will vary depending on type of article entered. Refer to appropriate emegory.

— Best Interview Story

Article is dependent on the use of extensive quotes. Quotations should make up at least 60 percent of the article. Best Festure Story

An article that entertains through material that is interesting but not necessarily important. Em-phasis should be on rich detail and liberal use of queues. It should focus on humas, interest.

Best Festerette An article that contains the elements of a feature story but is shorter. Length should not exceed 6 columns inches

Best Sports Feature A sports feature is on a spon-related topics. If would contain the same elements and guidelines of a feature article.

 Best Photograph with Caption Photograph can be a news, feature, or sports subject. Along with published picture and cantion, if possible, send original photograph so that printing enters can be accounted for

Best Humorous Column

An article under a permanent title written regulasty and giving expression to the writer sepinion. It would have a lighter tone either through writing style and/or subject matter.

Best Editorial Commun Au article under a permanent title written regularly and giving expression to the writer's own opinion. The editorial column should be of a

serious nature Best Sports Column Like the editorial not humosoms column, the

spons column differs only in that its subject deals with sports. Best Sports Story

A news article that emphasizes timely action, including coverage of sperting events. A may be an advance, follow-p, summary, or combination

Best Front Page Layuut Enter one front page tearshoet. Best Overall Layout Enter one complete issue.
